

WONGAVERY ASIA PACIFIC PEACE MUSEUM

Situated in Toronto, the WongAvery Asia Pacific Peace Museum (APPM) is the first in the world to be dedicated to educating and commemorating the entirety of the history of World War II in Asia. With humanity and peace as its themes, it is a historical milestone. It is a place to witness and remember a forgotten and ignored history, and a space to provoke research and actions for peace and reconciliation.

The APPM exhibit contents and designs are founded on the principles of authenticity, equity, justice, compassion, respect, and are based on the premise of education. The APPM is a place to host permanent and feature exhibitions that provide critical understanding of the causes and consequences of the atrocities of WWII in Asia; a research hub for academics and students to engage in critical inquiry on various aspects of the war; an education platform that hosts educational programs, lectures, workshops, film screenings for youths, educators, and the community; and a centre for commemorative events.

2024 CATALYST FOR CHANGE AWARDS

EDUCATOR AWARD

The Catalyst for Change (C4C) Educator Award recognises educators whose work align with ALPHA Education's mission of empowering young people to see themselves as constructive contributors and informed, responsible global citizens in advancing cultures of peace through critical inquiry and understanding of the history of WWII in Asia.



When **Joy Kim** entered middle school in Cobourg, Ontario, she was thrown into French Immersion and expected to swim. In 2007, Joy Kim graduated from the University of Waterloo with an Honours Arts degree in French Teaching Specialization and a Bachelor of Education through Brock University. From there, she started her journey as an educator in the YRDSB and is currently a TDSB Vice-Principal at Westview Centennial Secondary School.

When Joy discovered the "iHistory Meets Humanity Series", she seized the opportunity and partnered with ALPHA Education's team on bringing the often-untold history of

WWII in Asia. At the time, ALPHA Education was also partnered with Westview on the "Shadows of Racism, Voices UnHeard" project through the Centre of Excellence for Black Student Achievement. Through both series of workshops, participants were engaged in rich discussions around humanity, racism, and social justice. Staff and students, especially those who identified as being Asian, felt empowered as their history and experiences, often overlooked, were being acknowledged, validated and given a voice.

When Joy isn't seeking valuable experiential learning opportunities for her school community, she can be found at home playing the role of referee to her two young boys.

2024 CATALYST FOR CHANGE AWARDS

YOUTH AWARDS

The Catalyst for Change (C4C) Youth award recognises the contributions of young people and their commitment by example in active contributions to critical inquiry and understanding of WWII in Asia. It also recognises their constructive leadership in advancing global peace by engaging other youth to see themselves as future serving leaders.



Ever since **Vanessa Chen** was introduced to ALPHA Education in high school, she has been involved with the organization. She participated in the Oral History Project: Voices Otherwise Unheard in 2017 and went on to become a member of the ALPHA Education university chapter at Western University from 2018 to 2021. In the summer of 2020, Vanessa joined the Asia Pacific Peace Museum (APPM) team as a museum development researcher through the Canada Summer Jobs program. She supported research and design for a number of exhibits.

Vanessa is currently a first-year medical student at Western University where she continues to be involved with researching for the APPM through the service learning

program. She is excited to continue nurturing her love for history and passion for ALPHA Education's mission throughout her educational and professional journey.



Chen Chen is a medical student at Queen's University with a passion for medical research and healthcare, having already earned an MSc from the University of Toronto Department of Molecular Genetics and a BSc at McMaster University. Inspired by various history teachers and the unresolved frustrations from her family in China, Chen is also committed to preserving the voices of WWII survivors and their families for generation to come.

Chen's advocacy for issues surrounding the history and legacies of WWII in Asia has had deep impact in her communities. As co-president of McMaster ALPHA, she raised


awareness for WWII atrocities and introduced discussions on ethics in post-war trials through photo exhibits and film screenings. For UofT ALPHA, Chen engaged students through art competitions and podcasts spotlighting survivors of WWII in Asia. At medical school, Chen used her interview with the director of the Unit 731 Museum in Harbin, China to familiarize her peers with the roles that physicians played in human experimentation and biochemical warfare during WWII in Asia.

Lastly, Chen has volunteered for the APPM. Through research, she created content for permanent exhibitions, offering visual display ideas based on family stories. Given limited physical space and an extensive volume of testimonies, she also designed supplementary app content. She has won an Ontario Service Award and CPAC Youth Award for her service at the museum and student education.

OUR MUSEUM EDUCATION PROGRAMS

What does it mean to learn from history? Why is it important to remember World War II in the Asia Pacific theatre, as we do for the European theatre?

The answers and response to these two key questions will be central to our museum-based education initiatives which will focus on engaging youth, educators, and communities.

It is our intention that the learning ALPHA Education provides on war aggression is also a journey of hope and peace, centering the impact and significance, for generations, of a war which affected much of the world. On a journey from a peace perspective, participants will hear the voices of those who experienced the scourges of war, engage in activities that deepen a reflective understanding of war and peace, and feel a connection to the past and its implications for the future: global peace for all.

Using a compassionate, immersive approach that transforms the history of WWII in Asia as a subject into experiences to be lived and felt, our museum-based education programs will inspire both primary and secondary audiences to consider the relevance to contemporary society and their own agency and power in building cultures of peace. At the same time, gain knowledge and understanding why 1931 -1945 war years are both the history of Asia and the world.

"Without peace, societies are often plagued by conflict, violence, and instability, which can hinder progress and result in the loss of lives and resources." (United Nations SDG 16)

It is this profound meaning-making capacity of self and of others that promote inclusive and peaceful societies. After all, in the words of Betty Reardon, a foundational figure in peace education, "We must change ourselves and our immediate realities and relationships if we are to change our social structures and our patterns of thought."

LOOKING AHEAD: OUR DIGITAL MUSEUM

ALPHA Education will build on its thoughtful experience of developing a physical museum to design and establish a digital museum, *Living History: Hope & Peace* that will enable learning anywhere and anytime. It will extend impact of our commitment to humanity and a better world provincially, nationally, and internationally.

This online project will be developed with the support of the Digital Museums Canada investment program. Digital Museums Canada is managed by the Canadian Museum of History, with the financial support of the Government of Canada.

EXAMPLES OF OUR EDUCATION PROGRAMS



Summer Internship Program

Youth: Canadian & International undergraduates & postgraduates

An eight-week full or a six-week audit program to promote exploration of sustainable peacebuilding, through critical inquiry of the history and legacies of World War II in Asia. Participants in the full program complete a research project in an area of their interest that at the same time contributes to ALPHA Education's research and education programs.



Pro Bono Students Canada (PBSC) Program

Youth: Students from University of Toronto Faculty of Law & Lincoln Alexander School of Law. ALPHA Education provides a curriculum on WWII in Asia as background knowledge for the student research on legal topics related to WWII in Asia. In 2023 – 2024, students researched and produced papers on post-war trials, survivor lawsuits, and post-war treaties and agreements, adding to ALPHA Education publications which students in other programs could use.



Global Engagement Projects

Youth: University of Michigan undergraduates enrolled in the Global Scholarship Program Undergraduate from various academic disciplines in the University of Michigan Global Scholars Program examine the history WWII in Asia and social change to develop historical thinking about the past into current and future social praxis.



iHistory Meets Humanity (iHMH)

Youth: Grades 10 -12 students

iHMH offers a range workshops on topics & issues on WWII in Asia. Students learn about the untold histories and their connections to social injustices such as racism, violence against women, forced labour, displacement, fragmentation of communities and more. Critical historical thinking, perspectives-taking, and empathy are fostered.



Shadows of Racism, Voices Unheard

Youth: Grades 9 – 12 students

Funded by the Government of Canada, the project workshops explore history, identity, and representation. Centering student voices, students connect with their communities to listen, learn, and re-tell their stories of excellence and contributions to Canada, using art and video, as counter narratives to racism, discrimination and hate. It is with hope that the unheard stories will spark similar narratives and conversations beyond theirs.


